The event, which runs from Friday, October 14, 2011 – Sunday, October 16, 2011, features 50 arts and craft booths, a 200+ classic car show, a 5K Crab Crawl run, and the internationally recognized Southern rock band, .38 Special in a Saturday night concert. The morning before the festival opens to the general public, special needs children from across the Coastal Empire are invited for a magical morning of fun and exploration. Rides are slowed, music is turned down and Kissel Entertainment dedicates its morning to serving these 100 special customers.

"Three years ago, I got involved with the festival as a volunteer," continued Askew, "and I moved the commitment to a sponsorship the next year.
